# Shootin' the Breeze With the Studebaker Dude

## **Roger Hamby**

I lost a good friend on the 8<sup>th</sup> of December. His obituary mentioned his prize bird dogs and anyone that knew Roger well, knew about his love for his hunting dogs. But there are many Dixonites that may not have known him personally, but they may have noticed all the classic cars in differing stages of completion parked around his house out on South Rio Dixon Road across from the air strip. That is what caught my eye as the new postmaster commuting into town on Hwy 113 back in 1996. When I bought my old clunker Studebaker in 2002, I wanted to get to know this guy as I needed someone with mad skills to make my old car something worthy of the cover of a magazine. Roger would become that guy, and a friend.



Garry Pederson was the rural carrier for that address back then and he introduced me to Roger. Soon I was on the waiting list for a complete resto-mod rebuild of my car. Roger questioned me about spending a lot of money on a 4-door car and I assured him that



was one of the features that I liked the most about it. Station wagons and 4-door cars used to be taboo in the custom car world but not so much now. He placed me on the waiting list and assured me he could finish the car by the time I retired in 2006. As I got closer and closer to my retirement date, it became apparent that deadlines didn't mean a whole lot to him. He did pick up the car and trailer it out to his shop before I retired but I knew he didn't have enough time to finish it.

I retired and took a retirement job at the UC Davis mailroom to keep me occupied while Carlene finished out her career. I left that job after short order and got to spend some time with Roger working on the car before I started my Readi-Ride job. By then, he was working on the car in earnest. For those that

rode my bus during that period of time, you might remember seeing pictures of my car taped to the bulkhead inside. I would switch them up as the build progressed

switch them up as the build progressed.

I connected with Roger and we became great friends as did most every-body that had him build their car. I grew up with a father that was a body and fender man by occupation and he was always building cars for friends. My dad was an avid hunter also, so hanging out with Roger seemed natural to me. His friends used to laugh at me because I would be out at the shop to take pictures every time he bolted on a new part. I have a complete collection of photos depicting the entire restoration. I picked out a few of the more significant ones to accompany this story. I was showing these photos to Jason, Roger's son, and he told me an interesting anecdote about the picture showing the car freshly painted but still unassembled. Jason told me that Roger made him paint the walls in his paint booth before he painted my car. He knew I would be back with my camera. It is another great picture.



Roger finished my car in 2010. It was a difficult build for him. I had given him a list of things I wanted in the car that was, to me, a list of suggestions. After all, he was the expert and not me. I think he saw it more as a list of "must haves" and I think I failed to communicate that properly to him. I recommended a front suspension unit that was advertised in our Studebaker magazine as having been engineered for a 1951 Champion. It was a piece of junk and poor Roger was in over his head trying to make it work.

He would have preferred to just drop a Camaro front clip in it and be done with it. That would have been better but neither of us knew that the suspension we purchased was not up to the task. But there is no mistaking that he made the car beautiful.

As I introduced the car into the local car scene and the Studebaker world, it got a lot of attention. I won many awards with it, the best of which was a 395 of 400 possible points first place at the Studebaker International Meet in St. Louis. It graced quite a few magazines, sometimes on the cover. It even appeared on the header page of the Jay Leno's Garage web site. I got copies of these and took them out to Roger. He really appreciated that I shared these accomplishments with him.

When I heard that Roger had passed away, and that he would have a service at the Moose Lodge, the first thing I did was go outside and plug in the battery tender. I wanted to bring the car as a tribute. I have two beautiful Studebakers and I rotate them from time to time. I hadn't driven the bullet nose in a while and knew she would need a little



charge before I swapped them out. I wanted to speak at the gathering and I knew he would be the subject of my next story, so my mind has been sorting through thoughts of what Roger Hamby meant to me.

I had always wanted to build cars and when my dad passed away in 1985, it seemed as though that might not happen again. We did build a Scout truck together and he was always willing to share his skill and passion with me, but life has a way of getting in the way. Even when my dad retired, I was busy with my career and before I knew it, he was gone. When I started thinking about my relationship with Roger, it occurred to me that it was an extension of the relationship I could no longer have with my dad. Roger was close to my age and my dad was 30 years old when I was born. He's been gone now for 30 years and so Roger was about my dad's age the last time we spent any quality time together. And in my mind, I'm certainly not 67.

Roger was laden with health issues in the last few years. I got to talk to him for a long time just a few weeks ago and while he put on a secure persona, I could tell he was struggling. I'm sure it was difficult for him to no longer do what he loved doing so much. I like to think he's in a better place now. I'm hoping he has met my dad and I picture them talking cars over some beers. I bet the beer is great in heaven.

This story was published in the Dixon Tribune on December 21 2018 as part of my **Shootin the Breeze with the Studebaker Dude** weekly columns. I've reprinted it here as I have many friends in the club that were witness to the build and my friendship with Roger. Even though there were many problems with my car, It never interfered with our friendship. Roger was a good guy.

## Applied Technology: Tire Pressure Sensors By: Pete Yuen (Taken from Odds and Ends)

Some of the newer cars have been equipped with the tire pressure sensors for a number of years now. The sensors are in essence, a transmitter/pressure gauge that sends data to the car's computer. They are not cheap, priced at between \$75 and \$150 each. The projected life expectancy is 10 years of the built in battery life but some are known to have failed in as little as 4 years. The batteries cannot be taken out and replaced so the whole unit has to be replaced. As if this is not bad enough, some of the sensor units are made of aluminum and break easily as a person tries to remove them in order to add more air into the tire. They are not repairable so a new sensor needs to be installed. It can be presumed that many motorist will consider the sensors as a bit of frivolous equipment but nowadays, the cars that are equipped with them are considered to have them built in as part of the safety system and operating a vehicle with one sensor missing is considered as circumventing the safety system. Not a good idea as viewed by law enforcement and the insurance underwriters. In the case of a motorist deciding to purchase a new set of wheels for the winter tires, he would need to purchase sensors for each of the tires. Apparently, a motorist did want to purchase a new set of tires and wheels for his car that was equipped with the sensors and did not want to purchase the sensors. The shop had the customer sign a liability waiver form. The car was later, involved in an accident and still, despite the motorist having signed the liability waiver, the court decided that the tire shop, operating as a business professional, should have known not to have equipped the wheels without the sensors and thereby circumventing the built in safety feature. It is said that the tire shop had to pay a hefty amount to satisfy the claim in court.

Life is much simpler with Studebakers. Lucky you!
