# International Drive your Studebaker Day Angels Camp Museum

#### KER FARM WAGON Studebaker Brothers Manufacturing Company of South Bend, Indiana offered a variety of all-purpose vehicles for general use and perfectly suited for farm operations. This wagon is a typical example which has been well used but is basically still original with minimal modifications. When new, some of the standard features of this wagon would include a spring seat mounted on risers (since modified), a foot board, tool box (missing) and a roller brake system. The box bed fits the description of what Studebaker called a "California Box Bed" with a length of ten feet, six inches and a width of three feet, two inches. The floor has been r by installing longer boards over the original floor boards of tongue and groove ash (note the drop gate is in the down position). The running gear and wheels were painted red and the body was a dark green—evidence of both colors can be found in a number of places over the entire wagon.

# A family affair made Studebaker successful

n the 19th century, it was common for brothers to start businesses together. There were natural advantages, at least in those families in which siblings got along well, including an element of trust, a pooling of resources and an acceptance of the ups and downs of business life. The Studebaker brothers of South Bend exemplified such an arrangement. Five of them founded the most successful wagon-building company in the United States, and that firm became a leading automobile manufacturer.

In 1852, the two oldest brothers — Clem and Henry — started a small wagon construction shop in South Bend. Just as they were running short of money, brother John M. offered \$7,000 in profit from the California Gold Rush, and the partnership expanded.

During the Civil War, the brothers won a contract to provide wagons for the U.S. Army, and that lay the foundation for a reputation of well-built vehicles.

A fourth brother, Peter, was a natural salesman. He moved to St. Joseph, Mo., the gateway to the Oregon Trail. The Studebaker Manufacturing Co. was soon supplying thousands of wagons to settlers crossing the plains and mountains of the West

Jacob, the youngest, helped the company develop a successful buggy-making trade. By 1900, the company had built 1 million wagons and buggies and employed more than 2,500 men and women in its South Bend factory.

Clem, the president, was a close friend of Indiana's only president, Benjamin Harrison. He supported

Harrison's successful candidacy in 1888, and the president-elect purchased five Studebaker carriages.

Soon afterward, Clem Studebaker completed a palatial mansion, Tippecanoe Place, on West Washington Street in South Bend. Designed in the Romanesque style by noted Chicago architect Henry Ives Cobb, the home commanded attention with its turrets, stone arches and granite exterior. Clem and wife Ann contributed most of the funds

needed to build an imposing English Gothic structure for St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church in 1900.

Clem died in 1901. John, the last remaining brother, assumed the presidency of the company. The new century brought experimentation with building first electric, then gasoline automobiles. In 1910, John's son-in-law, Frederick Fish, reorganized the firm as a modern corporation and committed it to building automobiles.

After World War I, Studebaker built new factories, and by 1927 it was turning out more than 270,000 automobiles per year. The next 40 years brought downturns and revivals, as Studebaker strove to maintain its status as the fourth-largest American automaker. Popular models included the Commander, Champion and the Lark. Famed industrial designer Raymond Loewy created streamlined and eye-catching looks.

Studebaker, however, couldn't compete with the much larger firms in Detroit and went out of business in 1963.

There's still much to see and experience of the Studebaker era in South Bend. Some of the best vehicles the company made may be seen at the Studebaker National Museum. Tippecanoe Place now houses a fully restored restaurant. St. Paul's United Methodist Church continues to meet in its Gothic building. Inside are stained glass windows crafted by Mayer & Co. of Munich. On Main and Lafayette streets, the 1906 administration building and the 1923 body assembly structure await new uses. #### **Need Wheels?**


Any wheel of the late '70's through '89 Chrysler, rear wheel drive cars will work on your Studebaker. Some are wider than others. The Chrysler '85 Fifth Avenue wheel works great on Studebakers that have disc brakes on the front plus they hold the original hub caps too. Wheels from a rear wheel drive, full size Ford wheels fit on Studebakers as well When looking for replacement wheels make sure that the holes for the wheel lugs are not elongated. The elongation of the holes would indicate wear due to the wheel being loose when the car was driven. Regardless of whether you use Ford or Chrysler product wheel as replacements, be sure to use Ford or Chrysler nuts to match the rim. The Ford nuts are 13/16th inch instead of the 3/4 inch ones that Studebaker used. Why replace the wheels, you may ask? It may be that your Studebaker wheels are worn and cracked around the bolt holes or you may wish to use wider tires than the original ones. After changing the tires and wheels, be sure to tighten them properly. Studebaker specifies 75 to 83 foot pounds of torque. If tires are changed at a garage or tire shop, ask that they use a torque wrench limiter to 75 foot pounds of torque. Some shops will try to tell you that their impact wrench is set to the right pressure. Don't believe it. Overtightening or undertightening can cause wheel damage which is not immedi-If you decide ately apparent. to use Ford rims, be sure to have a 13/16th inch wrench in the trunk of your car.
